She served as a juror for film festivals in Japan, Canada, and the United States, and presented many screenings of her

In 2005, a special program of Ms. Aqua's animated films was presented in Iran at the Tehran International Animation Festival. Since 1990 she directed/animated 22 segments for "Sesame Street." Ms. Aqua's recent film, "Twist of Fate," was screened at Telluride Film Festival, Starz Denver Film Festival, Kos Ippokratis International Health Film Festival in Greece, as well as at international animation festivals in Ottawa, Hiroshima,

and Annecy in France. The film received awards at Ann Arbor Film Festival, James River Film Festival, and Black Maria Film and Video Festival. Her most recent film, "Taxonomy," recent film, "Taxonomy," was completed just before her death and debuted at the Institute of Contemporary Art in Boston.
